

Dear Friends,

We have had Easter, not just Easter weekend but the whole 'Season of Easter' leading up to Ascension Day. 10 Days after Jesus returned to Heaven came Pentecost, which we marked last Sunday. The Equipping of the church for mission!

You can read the account of what happened in the Bible, the book of Acts Chapter 2. And the rest of Acts describes how the young Church developed as a result. A small group of cowering individuals meeting in secret because of fear that the authorities would treat them as they had their leader, became bold and outgoing, spreading good news and being used powerfully by God including in miraculous healings. A worldwide movement of faith got underway.

Why is this relevant to us today? Well, the Bible makes it clear that God always intended that the empowering work of the Holy Spirit was meant for all believers in all nations and all generations. So, that means us as well?!

Church is not meant to be intellectual but experiential. And we, today, are still invited to receive similar spiritual experiences as those first followers of Jesus experienced. That is one of the reasons that we hold 'Healing Services' at Lowestoft, where we invite people to explore spiritual reality including with prayers for healing.

Here at Halesworth, before Covid, we regularly had a personal prayer ministry team available after the Sunday morning worship. I am looking to re-introduce this. So, if you were part of the team, or are someone God may be calling to be involved for the future, I will be seeking to have a word with you.

We also have the Friday prayer meetings with coffee after. Whether you are thinking of coming to healing at Lowestoft, feel called to join the prayer team here, need to start coming to the prayer meeting or indeed one of

the home groups, let's all seek to be more open to the empowering work of the Holy Spirit – in our lives too!

How to pray for Israel and Gaza?

A few weeks ago an item popped up in one of my news feeds: What the Bible says about the Israel-Gaza war

(https://www.premierchristianity.com/opinion/what-the-bible-says-about-the-israel-gaza-war/16784.article if you would like to read it for yourself). This turns out to be a very complex question, not surprisingly. The author, Rev Mark Woods says we look to the Bible for guidance, particularly in big things, and surely it must say something about this, but if we go to the Bible for simple answers we won't find them. A knowledge of scripture texts alone is not enough, we need to understand what's happening there. Great wrongs have happened to both sides, and both sides have committed terrible deeds on the other. Woods suggests there are three things in particular we need to do to and three things that should shape how we pray (we may not agree, but they are interesting and worthy of consideration)


- 1 We need to feel, not just think: both sides are driven by an intense moral conviction that is felt in the heart
- 2 We need to know our history and current affairs.
- 3 We need to know that Christians before us have thought about war too.

And when we pray

- 1 No human being is worth more or less than another because of where they were born or the language they speak; each of us is made in the image of God.
- 2 Christians resign vengeance into God's hands. We should pray that the desire for revenge
- is restrained and that good prevails.
- 3 We believe the words of Jesus who said 'Blessed are the peace-makers, for they will be called children of God"

I have recently read and enjoyed two books, very different in scope and viewpoint, which, it occurred to me, would coincidentally help inform our knowledge of the history and current affairs.

Bethlehem: biography of a town, by Nicholas Blincoe. Bethlehem is in



Palestine, no longer the "little town" of Christmas and the Bible but a modern city with a university, and was predominantly, in modern times, an Arab Christian town until Yasser Arafat arrived. The author is married to an Arab film maker and spends his time between Bethlehem and London. Quoting from the Guardian review, the book is 'part history, part travelogue and memoir...a highly discursive, frequently amusing, often tragic but always accessible history. The history of Bethlehem, from stone age to the present, is the

history of that piece of land that has been Canaan and Palestine and Israel and always the Promised Land to the Jews, a strip of land that was an important trade route and therefore a desirable possession to many different empires

The Jewish Jesus: reconnecting with the truth about Jesus, Israel and the Church, by David Hoffbrand. Hoffbrand is a Jewish Christian, lives in Brighton and is a member of a Pentecostal church. In this easy, friendly, compelling book he explores with wit and clarity the answers to questions such as "what relevance does it have for us (Christians) that Jesus is Jewish and what difference should it make to our faith?" On the way he emphasises God created and chose Israel, God loves Israel, the Church hasn't



replaced Israel, God is not punishing Israel, God has a continuing plan for Israel, that gentile Christians are grafted into the tree of Israel. Along the way a positive future for Israel is in the frame, so maybe this book is an antidote, if any were needed, to the book above!



Rambling...again!

It goes without saying that I will never understand God.. The Creator is not an 'impersonal force' (as some would have it) that's too easy. Neither is God an indulgent, old grandfather, or Superman, an extra-terrestrial, or a time traveller. None of our merely human explanations can hope to come near to the truth. There is, however, one human understanding which we can see in God's creation... He reveals himself as PERSONAL. Not 'a person' but THE PERSON, from which every other personality derives its "personhood".

As I sit here in my garden, I realise that He bestows personality on everything He creates, even those parts of creation which we call inanimate. How often have you been in the presence of great hills, or mountains, even trees, and felt their brooding authority? Water has many characteristics in its many forms. Think of the majestically powerful sea and its moods, ranging from thunderous fury to languid benevolence. Peaceful rivers, effervescent streams, water tamed to provide irrigation and household duties or unruly, unpredictable, unstoppable floods. And that does not even mention the ravishing beauty of snow, or the treacherous ice.

I'm sitting here on the grass, (it would be breaking the Trades Description Act to call it a lawn!) and I love what I see around me. In this anthropomorphic mood, the daisies encroach on my attention. Bright eyed, perky and 'in your face', I just KNOW they have the adenoidal voices of American, teenage girls: insistent and annoyingly optimistic. "Have a nice Day" reverberates around my brain, whenever I see them enthusiastically "starring" their green heaven, always (stunningly) alert and impressionable.

The buttercups, on the other hand, are clearly not impressed by the incessant clamour of their neighbours. They are totally secure in the knowledge that they are "noticed". Their petals are vibrant and shiny, both reflecting and radiating the bright, sun colour...wantonly calling the pollinating insects. Do I hear self-satisfied, buttery, yawns? Despite all this colourful enticement, the bees seem to prefer the clover, which resembles a fading, Edwardian spinster in her muted colours and

lace edged, elegant clothes. Understated and unassuming she may be: but her gentle benevolence would seem to be more attractive than her more "showy" neighbours.

There is another inhabitant of this meadow-like patch of grass, but I am ignorant of horticultural lore, so I don't have a clue as to its name. Little more than ground cover, it has a small, deep purple flower. "Hear I am!" I detect a wee, small voice. "Yes, that's me, down here! Isn't the sun lovely?? We may have rain soon you know....." Being so small she doesn't get much in the way of conversation, well we all have our place!

Lord, your creation is stunning, immense, mysterious, intricate, intriguing and (thank you Lord) brimming over with personality, by your amazing creativity.
