Dear Friends

May – what a joyful month to enter. Spring is in full swing, its heat even teasing us with occasional thoughts of summer, and there's the promise of more bank holidays on the horizon. With Easter celebrations fresh in our memory, we may be entering this next chapter of Spring with a word in our mind: renewal. We see it in the flowers, we feel it in the weather (even in the rain!), but do we see it in our lives?

Answers to prayer can feel slow sometimes, or like everyone receives them but us. But a quiet answer doesn't mean silence, and a slow response doesn't mean God is stationary. When God appeared to Elijah, it wasn't from the wind, it wasn't from the earthquake or the fire – it was from the still, small voice. (1 Kings 19:11-12) God's actions in our lives are all around us, but they don't always arrive with a fanfare, and they rarely look the way we expected.

When I took the URC's Stepwise course, its biggest impact for me was in a very simple-seeming part of the program: the question we were asked at the start of every session. "Where did you see God working in your life this week?" At first, it was hard to answer: usually, I wasn't sure what to say, and neither was anyone else. But as the weeks passed, our answers got more animated. We learned to look for God. What had felt like reading "Where's Wally", under pressure at the start, gradually turned into something organic and beautiful.

Sometimes, being a Christian can be like living with a partner who leaves us unprompted presents on the counter, "post its" with encouraging words on the fridge, or tidies up when we've had a long day and can't face it, but we don't notice. Perhaps because we're focused on a particular stress or concern in our life, or because we're run off our feet. When we're focused on that problem that won't seem the shift, it can be hard to see the rest. God isn't in plain view. Instead, God asks us to engage, trust and look – and when we do, things start to change. We notice the 'just because' gifts, we receive the encouraging notes, and we realise that when we sit and fret on the sofa, someone has been sitting next to us.

It doesn't mean we get that particular answer we're waiting for. But we see the many, many little answers that move for and with us every day. For my Stepwise class, learning to spot these small miracles and realise the incredible love they were telling us about – that was our renewal. And it keeps on renewing.

In Luke's account of Palm Sunday, Jesus tells the Pharisees, regarding the praising crowds: "If they keep quiet, the very stones will cry out." (Luke 19:40). In Psalm 19, the beauty of the skies declares God's glory. God's whole creation reflects and celebrates God's goodness – the message is ever-present and immutable. Even if we miss a reason to praise, the world around us hums and sings with it. But what a joy, to notice more and more reasons to give God thanks, and to join in with the sky and the stones.

I said last month that the need to really get going with preparation for the Mission is increasing. This is even more so now:

A small steering group has been formed and we are working on the content of the programme. Already it will include links with Conquest Art, Brownies and Edgar Sewter School.

We will host the team working in the northern part of the Suffolk Coastal area, Halesworth & Southwold. We don't yet know whether the visiting team will sleep in the church or be hosted in our homes.

We still have a lot to do in prayer and preparation, to discern these details and to prepare the ground: Think of Jesus telling the Parable of the Sower (Mark 4, also in Matthew & Luke). We want the seed to fall on 'good soil' and our prayerful preparation is a major part of that.

We also need to be prayerfully considering what each of us might contribute, You may also wish to consider which of these roles you could be involved in:

- Mission Coordinator
- Prayer coordinator
- Follow up coordinator
- Hospitality either in your home or helping with food if the team sleep in the church
- Publicity
- Joining the steering group
- Being part of a mission specific prayer group
- Joining a follow-up team, both one-to-one follow up and the delivery of the Alpha Course immediately after the mission.

Meanwhile, we have submitted a Synod grant application to assist with the costs.

Please keep praying. The week of 6-14 September will be an intense focal point. The preparation before and follow up after are just as important. Why not ask the Lord for opportunities to develop relationships with others as you look forward to inviting them to mission events.
